Your message: Dear Sir, First of all I wish to congratulate DCNZ on offering the worst value for money in all the major health disciplines. I submit that the planned increase in fees being used to re write the practice standards is a poor use of DCNZ funds. In recent years the value of DCNZ standards at the proposal stage has been at a low ebb and has wasted much money. I draw your attention to the Cone Beam Radiography standard that was plagiarized from the United Kingdom without acknowledgement. I also remember the emergencies in practice proposal that was so bad it had to be largely re-written due to the number mistakes. The best your advisor's could come up with was missing out first line drugs for myocardial infarction as well as other serious errors I would therefore question the abilities of those who appointed the team as well as the advisor's themselves. I realize that the DCNZ board changes regularly, but is it time to change the advisor's, some of whom have been in position for a great number of years?
