Q5 Please describe your specific concern/s with the proposal

- 1. Comprehensive dental care for adults requires much more in terms of diagnosis and treatment planning than simply the treatment of caries in isolation. Adults present with a wide range of complexities in terms of their medical and dental histories, particularly over time. Treatment of adults is much more challenging than simply treating dental caries. There are many additional physiological and psychological aspects to consider. Without any age restriction on the scope of Oral Health Therapists, these patients may be potentially placed at risk if there is any oversight in their care due to inadequate training and experience.
- 2. Concern about how the new scope of practice will be regulated without any clear definition of the extent of restorative care permissible to OHTs in the new scope.
- 3. Concern that the childhood caries rates in New Zealand are higher than in Australia and the UK. There is already a high demand for dental therapists to treat childhood caries in many communities, particularly rural communities. The workforce currently has no shortage of dentists to treat adults. The treatment of dental caries in children should be the primary concern for OHTs.
- 4. The inconsistency between dental therapy and OHT scopes of practice is an administrative issue and should not impact on providing safe dental care for the public.
