I am not convinced that the Council should be revisiting this issue just yet. In 2016 the Council decided that restorative activities on patients 18 years and older should not form part of the OHT scope because the current NZ OHT programmes could not equip graduates with the necessary clinical experience and competence to perform restorative procedures on patients 18 years and over. This position did not align with the Council's legal obligation that the education currently delivered by the New Zealand oral health programmes must underpin the proposed oral health therapy scope of practice. The Council maintained the position throughout that it was fundamental that the proposed oral health therapy scope of practice reflect the education delivered by the New Zealand oral health programmes. From a patient safety perspective, the Council confirmed its position that restorative activities on patients 18 years and over, performed under prescription of a dentist, should not form part of the proposed oral health therapy scope of practice." In 2019, the both NZ OH programmes have not changed in this regard, and postgraduate upskilling programmes are only under development and still not currently available, nor accredited. In view of this, it seems premature for Council to be reconsidering this proposal at the moment.
