I personally believe that we have so much backlog in the care of our young people that including a whole new scope into BOH practice will only further the waitlists for our young children to be seen. I also believe that even with 5 years of training to receive a BDS qualification there are still many people in NZ receiving unsatisfactory dental care. So to then introduce many people into the workforce that have only had 3 years of tertiary training we will only end up with worse dental outcomes in our community. I also think that for franchises that employ both hygienists and dentists that for them this is just an opportunity to take a bigger cut of profit by charging adults at a set rate per procedure but paying a hygienist at a lower rate. I also worry that if they stagger the pricing to where the hygienist can restore adults at a cheaper cost that the public will steer away from the more expensive yet more qualified dentist- ultimately making the job of dental professionals redundant.

I understand that dentistry in NZ needs change for more equitable outcomes, but the pathway to this isn't through letting an already overworked OHT widen there scope. In this scenario no body benefits except for the companies that host both dentists and OHT.
