The following replaces the prescribed qualifications for the Scope of Practice for Oral Pathology Specialists as published in the *New Zealand Gazette*, 11 October 2024, Notice No. 2024-sl5119. The scope of practice and competencies for oral pathology specialists published in the *New Zealand Gazette*, 19 January 2023, Notice No. 2023-sl78 remain unchanged.

Prescribed qualifications for the scope of practice for oral pathology specialists

New Zealand accredited programme

- MDS (Oral Pathology) University of Otago¹.
- DClinDent (Oral Pathology) University of Otago.
- Fellowship in Oral and Maxillofacial Pathology from the Royal College of Pathologists of Australasia².

Competent Authority- Qualification

Australia

- An ADC accredited MDS or MDSc programme in oral pathology³.
- ~~an Australian educational institution specialist qualification approved by the A Dental Board of Australia approved programme of study providing a qualification~~ for the purposes of specialist registration in oral pathology in Australia⁴.

Competent Authority- Registration⁵

- current full/unrestricted/unconditional registration appropriate for practice as an oral pathology specialist with a competent authority(s) recognised by Council⁶; and
- clinical practice⁷ in specialist oral pathology in the recognised competent authority(s) for at least 24 months (working 20 hours or more per week) in the past five years, including 12 months within the last 18 months immediately prior to application.

Examination

- Two years or more of full-time equivalent postgraduate ~~training in the specialty oral pathology specialist qualification~~, evidence of research activity and a pass in the New Zealand Dental Specialist Registration Examination.
