The following replaces the prescribed qualifications for the scope of practice for prosthodontic specialists as published in the [New Zealand Gazette, 19 January 2023, Notice No. 2023-sl83](#). The scope of practice and competencies for prosthodontic specialists as published in the [New Zealand Gazette, 19 January 2023, Notice No. 2023-sl83](#) remain unchanged.

Prescribed Qualifications for the Scope of Practice for Prosthodontic Specialists

New Zealand Accredited Programmes

- MDS (Prosthodontics) University of Otago¹.
- DClintDent (Prosthodontics) University of Otago.

Competent Authority - Qualification

Australia

- An ADC accredited MDS or MDSc or DClintDent programme in prosthodontics².
- An Australian educational institution specialist qualification approved by the Dental Board of Australia for the purposes of specialist registration in prosthodontics in Australia³.

United States of America (USA)

- A USA educational institution specialist qualification in prosthodontics accredited by the Commission on Dental Accreditation and evidence of research activity.

Canada

- A Canadian educational institution specialist qualification in prosthodontics accredited by the Commission on Dental Accreditation of Canada and evidence of research activity.

Examination

- Two years or more of full-time equivalent postgraduate prosthodontic specialist qualification, evidence of research activity and a pass in the New Zealand Dental Specialist Registration Examination.

Competent Authority - Registration⁴ (from 1 November 2026)

- Current full/unrestricted/unconditional registration appropriate for practice as a prosthodontic specialist with a competent authority(s) recognised by the Dental Council⁵; and
- Clinical practice⁶ in specialist prosthodontics in the recognised competent authority(s) for at least 24 months (working 20 hours or more per week) in the past five years, including 12 months within the last 18 months immediately prior to application.

2. Before 30 June 2010, and before 17 October 2010 for Western Australia.
3. From 1 July 2010 onwards, and 18 October 2010 onwards for Western Australia.
4. Upon commencement of practice in New Zealand, practitioners registered under the competent authority registration pathway will practise under the oversight of a Dental Council approved practitioner for a period of at least six months under the terms of the oversight protocol.
5. United Kingdom (General Dental Council), Canada (provincial dental regulators), United States of America (state dental boards), Australia (Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency) for the purposes of prosthodontic specialist practice.
6. Clinical practice means the maintenance of health through the assessment, diagnosis, management, treatment, and prevention of any disease, disorder or condition of the orofacial complex and associated structures.

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
